League Management Committee is composed almost entirely of clubmen, elected by all the clubs at a general meeting. Yet not one representative of First Division clubs (which, after all, provide the main show in soccer) is represented, largely (though not in all cases) because the First Division clubs failed to send along men prepared to do what is rather a sticky job. Consequently, the ball was tossed to delegates from the minor divisions, many of whom are new to Victoria and have no idea of penalties or precedents.

So, if you have a grouch against League Management, first make sure that your own club is pulling its weight, and if not, see that your delegate has instructions at the next annual general meeting.





Last, but not least, this Association owes a lot to the efforts of Mr. Percy Ims (first secretary of the P.S.A.), who did so much of the early organising.

DANDENONG ROVERS



The price of 6d. is clearly marked on each copy. Should it become necessary to increase the price at any time, that price will be marked on the copy. If you pay any more than the marked price you are being overcharged. Owing to the power restrictions and consequent "blacking out" of some areas, Soccer News was late off the mark last week and some clubs did not receive copies in time. Clubs therefore are asked to co-operate and if copies are not received to inquire at your local post office (if received by post) or railway stations right up to the last minute on Saturdays to ensure delivery until once again the power situation gives our long-suffering printers a better "go."

Looking through the Junior results it is good to see that two more clubs—Polonia and Frankston—are fostering teams. Congratulations to these two. However, the gain is more than off-set by the loss of many other junior teams from older clubs. When, oh when, will clubs learn that the juniors of today are their players and officers of tomorrow? How many powerful clubs of yesterday have gone up in smoke for want of players in bad times, and want of officials even in good times? Clubs such as South Yarra, Box Hill and Brighton all have senior members and officials, some of whom were playing as boys with their clubs.
