FRANKSTON AGAIN DEFEATED

Last Saturday, Frankston was narrowly defeated by Coburg 3-2, after leading 2-1 at half time.

The Frankston line up was: Albers, Zelst, Pastischnys, Wren, Wilkes, Piggott, Heath, Richardson, Bierman, Herdman, Voegelzang.

Frankston kicked off into the strong wind blowing diagonally across the ground. The pace of the game was fast and play swung rapidly from end to end. After only five minutes of play, Bierman headed a Frankston clearance over the centre-half's head to Richardson, who outpaced the two full-backs and put a curving right foot shot past the advancing goal-

keeper to register Frankston's first goal.

Ten minutes later a Frankston defender was judged to have handled the ball while trying to clear a shot at goal. Although Albers got his fingers to the ball he could not prevent the spot-kick entering the net to bring up Coburg's first goal.

Five minutes before half-time, an attack down the left wing ended with a well-placed centre from Voegelzang being headed home by Bierman to give Frankston a 2-1 lead at half-time.

The forceful and determined tackling by the Frankston defence, which had kept the Coburg forwards subdued for most of the first half, disappeared after the opening clashes of the second half, and again spectators saw the forwards lying to far back.

Coburg equalised after 65 minutes of play and the last good goal of the game came 10 minutes later when after Coburg's inside right had left Albers sprawling full length with a fine shot, the ball rebounded to the outside left, who scored easily.

Frankston continued to attack, and although they more than matched Coburg's mid-field play they never really looked like scoring.

The main causes of Frankston's downfall were failure to hold the Coburg wingers in the second half, wild kicking in the general direction of the Coburg goal and above all failure to play the right wing, which would have been assisted greatly by the wind in the second half.

Next Saturday Frankston play the Victorian Colts, at Olympic Park, not doubt a curtain raiser as the kick off is at 1 p.m., and on Easter Monday they meet Sunshine United at Cranbourne rd., the kick off being at 2.45 p.m.

FRANKSTON IN TOP FOUR

A hat-trick by Bert Richardson and a header by Ray Lymer, which sizzled past the goalkeeper, gave Frankston a well-merited 4-1 win over Park Rangers last Saturday, and they now move to fourth position on the league table.

Frankston's team, which at long last appears to have settled into position, was: Albers; Bierman, Piggott; Mack, Wilkes, Wren; Heath, Richardson, Lymer, Betts, Herdman. Play opened in brilliant sunshine before a fair number of spectators, and for the first few minutes Frankston, with brilliant play, maintained a continuous attack. The Rangers, however, soon began to settle down, and from then on spectators saw some of the best football that has

been seen on the ground this season.

Neither team wasted any effort, and with accurate passing, control and positional play, the ball moved up and down the field, the keepers at both ends being called upon frequently, but it was the defences that controlled the game and at

half-time neither side had scored.

For the first 10 minutes of the second half, play was again very even, but in the 58th minute Richardson got his foot to a well-placed corner from Herdman, and Frankston took the lead and went further ahead two minutes later when Lymer scored with a perfect header.

With rain now falling, and assisted by a rather chilly breeze, the Frankston forwards were now worrying the Rangers' defence. In the 63rd minute, from a pass by Heath, Richardson beat two defenders and with a hard drive shot the ball clear of the keeper.

Four minutes later the Rangers scored their only goal from a penalty, and although they tried hard to further reduce the lead, the result was put beyond doubt in the 85th minute, when Richardson completed his hat-trick with another pile driver.

Actually the result was a little flattering to Frankston, as throughout the game play was fairly even, the exception being that Frankston took advantage of the opportunities to score. Vernon Heath was again in great form on the right wing, followed closely by Bert Richardson and Roy Lymer in attack, and Les Wilkes and Jos. Bierman in defence, but it was really the fine team work which gave such a good win.

Next week the game will be at Princes Park against Maccabi, a team Frankston has met on 12 previous occasions, but has yet to beat. For this game a bus will leave from opposite the railway station at 1 p.m. There's room for supporters in the bus.
