### FRANKSTON AGAIN DEFEATED

Last Saturday, Frankston was narrowly defeated by Coburg 3-2, after leading 2-1 at half time.

The Frankston line up was: Albers, Zelst, Pastischnys, Wren, Wilkes, Piggott, Heath, Richardson, Bierman, Herdman, Vogelezang.

Frankston kicked off into the strong wind blowing diagonally across the ground. The pace of the game was fast and play swung rapidly from end to end. After only five minutes of play, Bierman headed a Frankston clearance over the centre-half's head to Richardson, who outpaced the two full-backs and put a curving right foot shot past the advancing goal
The forceful and determined/tackling by the Frankston defence, which had kept the Coburg forwards subdued for most of the first half, dissappeared after the opening clashes of the second half, and again spectators's saw the forwards lying to far back.

Coburg equalised after 65 minutes of play and the last good goal of the game came 10 minutes later when after Coburg's inside right had left Albers sprawling full length with a fine shot, the ball rebounded to the outside left, who scored easily.


