Sandringham City took another step toward a place in First Division next year—by a runaway 7-2 victory over F.N.D. last week, and now look certain to take the league pennant.

A neck-and-neck struggle for the runner-up spot is taking place between Frankston and Austria with only two points the difference.

Frankston's visit to Hampton today for their first encounter with undefeated Sandringham City could well result in the best match of the season. Frankston Concedes Crucial Point

Austria moved closer to its objective of a First Division berth in 1960 by recording a valuable 4-0 win over Moorabbin City.
