of "throwing" its match at Highbury on April 23, when Arsenal won 5—2. "Utter nonsense," said United's skipper, Dennis

And Busby declared: "The situation has reached such a pitch that any team that loses is in danger of being accused of throwing the match."

Police were called in at Oldham, a few miles north-east of Manchester, but after taking statements from five players of the Oldham Athletic club decided to take no further action.
