



Frankston frittered away a chance of maintaining its fight for top four status when it slipped to a 2-1 defeat against Croatia.

Frankston played very defensively from the outset with four at the back and a sweeper in front of the back four, four in the middle and Kevin Wall left on his own up front wondering whether he had used the right deodorant on Sunday morning.

Frankston pushed players forward only in set piece situations and from one such situation in the 12th minute the Baysiders took the lead.

David Webb took a free kick just outside the Croatia area on Frankston's right.

He chipped the ball into the area where Sean Parton challenged Steve Kokoska, the ball being partly cleared then headed back behind the Croatia defence to the unmarked Bill Buchanan who steadied before driving a low, hard shot inside the far upright giving Peter Blasby no chance.

Croatia was forced into chipping high balls into the Frankston area using the swirling windy conditions to its advantage and from one such high ball, a John Gardiner chip, Mick Klarin read the flight of the ball well as it dropped over a Frankston defender, pushing it square to goal before unleashing a fierce drive from 8 metres that rocketed into the roof of the net to even the score.

The second half was full of controversy involving two controversial linesman decisions, controversial refereeing decisions involving a penalty to Croatia and a free kick to Frankston.

The result of the controversy was a converted penalty from Keith Adams, two disputed offside goals by Croatia and a free kick to Frankston from an infringement that looked suspiciously inside the area.

Les Thomson, earmarked for the transfer list since the end of last season, might have forced the Green Gully committee into a rethink after his performance on Saturday.

Playing his first game of the season, Thomson was given the tall order of a striking role against Frankston and despite finding the task far from easy, he gave a creditable performance before dropping back to do an even better job in midfield alongside the evergreen Billy Vojtek in the second half.

He showed an appetite for the ball, his distribution was good, and he slowed the game down to Gully's satisfaction towards the end. If he maintains the enthusiasm and once he reaches match fitness, he could prove a valuable asset in Bobby McLachlan's rebuilding plans.

Vojtek was among the best afield for the second week running and he seems to be performing better since he shed the coaching duties. He capped his game with a well taken goal scored on the volley from outside the area following a bad clearance from a corner.

Frankston paraded two new signings in strike Kevin Wall from Frankston Pines and fullback Chris Valli from Hakoah. The latter gave a good account of himself and coped well with Segi's runs down the right and Hogben's overlaps.

Wall tried hard all day but will take time to find his feet in the higher company. Both he and youngster Goran Runje will have to make more of Bruce Young's crosses if Frankston are to score goals.

Gully's John Patten dominated the box in aerial duels in the first half and Wall's only testing header in the second was well saved by Denys.

Young was Frankston's best player on the day and dominated his flank but he left it until the last ten minutes before having a crack at goals himself. Altona City and Frankston City – two clubs who worked so hard to cast off their 'unfashionable' image last season – are now at the crossroads. The question both clubs must ask themselves is do we continue trying to match the big guns when our crowd support indicates it is a financial impossibility.

I think if the clubs are realistic they will abandon any hopeful plans of conquering Makedonia and Croatia in the State League.

Frankston last season did almost that, but now finds itself in financial trouble with the prospect of having to rebuild its team.

The Bayside club finished second in 1979, but has lost five star players, and would have to spend heavily in the transfer market to construct a team comparable in strength to the one of 1979.

Frankston cast off its 'unfashionable' tag last season, and was unlucky not to win at least one trophy. However, to stay at the top requires money — lots of money — which is not in surplus at Frankston. Altona also spent heavily last season, although not to the same degree as Frankston. The club climbed to 11th in 1978 to sixth in 1979, and was no longer regarded as 'easy meat.'

Come 1980, and Altona has lost four players from its team which performed creditably last season, but was far from being a force.

It Altona was serious about reaching the top, it would have to sink large sums into its team — money again with is not readily available.

No, the future of Altona and Frankston lies in the youngsters they produce.

Last Saturday's Ampol Cup match between the two clubs featured many promising young players.

Altona fielded two 16 year olds — Billy Hammill and Jim Bartolo — plus Brian Kilpatrick, Cos Oliva, Lars Murphy and Sammy Deluca, who are all in their teens. Perhaps Altona's most promising player is John Little, who was blooded in the first team last season as a midfielder. However, coach Joe Wilson has switched him to left back this season, and he looks set for a successful career in that position.

Frankston had many young players in its team. Still in their teens are Tony Blacklaw, Peter Martinovic, Otto Leenstra, Goran Runje and John Rowe.

Kevin Wall, a striker from Frankston Pines, also played for Frankston City and is only 20.

The standard of play was poor, admittedly, but the experience gained by the young players can only improve them.

Hopefully these players will be given a chance to develop, as the progress of youth today, will directly determine the state of Victorian soccer tomorrow. — KYLE PATTER-SON.

Frankston recruit lost his

place to Bobby Moore

Victoria's present holders of the most appearances in the English League are about to relinquish their title to a player who is due to join Frankston City later this month.

Alun Evans and Billy Wilkinson are Melbourne's most experienced English League campaigners.

Evans' career in England took him from Wolves (20 appearances) via Liverpool (77) and Aston Villa (53) to Walsall (78) for a total of 228 league matches.

Wilkinson played for most of his career with Hull City (209) then spent a season at Rotherham United (14) for a total 223 league matches before going to America to play for Boston Minutemen.

However their career record easily is surpassed by that of Jimmy Dunne, Frankston's big capture, who has signed a threeyear contract with the club.

Dunne plied up a total of 386 appearances in a career that spanned 13 years in English soccer. Dunne was at Irish club Shelbourne before joining Millwall in 1966. The following year he joined Torquay United and spent three seasons there before transferring to Fulham for \$15,000 in 1970.

He helped Fulham in promotion to the Second Division in his first season and then totted up 87 Second Division matches in a four-year stint before making way for a player by the name of Bobby Moore in the Fulham side.

Dunne subsequently rejoined Torquay in April 1976 and figured either in midfield or defence for a further three seasons to bring his number of appearances for the club to 244.

Admittedly Frankston's buy has spent the larger part of his career in the Third & Fourth Divisions, whereas Evans and Wilkinson played mostly in the First and Second Division respectively.

However there is no escaping the fact that Dunne's experience will prove invaluable to the baysiders as they attempt to better last year's achievement of finishing league runners-up. • Frankston City's new signing Jimmy Dunne (second from left, standing), with the 1971 Fulham team. 
Frankston already has lined up a job for him as a sales representative and hopes that he will settle into the side quickly and help bring out the best in the club's youngsters.



Frankston midfielder Dave Cooper worked his heart out, doing the bulk of the running and ball-winning in midfield.


When Sean Parton crashed a scrambled clearance high into the roof of the net to make it 2-1 the Baysiders were in with a show.






