

NEIL: 'THANKS'

The Hellmuths are happy. More happy than we will ever know.

They are grateful... but afraid that 'thanks' will never be expressed adequately.

The final total when the appeal closed on Monday was \$10,200.

The Karingal United Soccer Club dance and players' special effort raised \$1700.

Other weekend donations included \$225 from Ballam Park Technical School, where Neil is a pupil, and \$100 from Peninsula Soccer Club.

An enormous financial burden has been lifted, and now the Hellmuth family can only wait and hope. But the past six weeks have proved that they are not alone.

The Hellmuth story is well known by now. Fifteen-year-old Neil Hellmuth has a congenital heart disease and needs surgery.

When the cost of the operation and associated expenses looked liked meaning and loss of the modest family home, Karingal United Soccer Club moved in and launched an appeal.

The target was set and there was an immediate

and incredible response. What seemed to be an impossible mark was reached quickly, and now the appeal has closed.

The Standard visited the Hellmuths last week and their thanks to all who had helped were simple and sincere. They were very happy.

Ron and Betty Hellmuth were still a little uneasy about what to say.

"Our hearts are filled with a certain peace and a feeling. But how do we express this gratitude? Just to say thank you seems so pathetically inadequate... but thanks to everyone."

That came also from Neil, because like most boys his age he didn't know what more to say.

The Hellmuths especially thanked the soccer club that

organised the appeal, its president, Mr Ron Kirkpatrick, and his wife, and Mr Colin Dickens, who acted as treasurer.

"The task of thanks is enormous," said Ron Hellmuth. "I don't have to think very hard before a flood of organisations, clubs, and individuals comes to mind... and the names of business houses, large and small."

"So please would everyone that has spared a prayer or thought for Neil, please accept his parents most heartfelt and humble THANKS."

Mr Ron Kirkpatrick, a family friend, added his thanks on behalf of the soccer club.

"The response was staggering and it's involved so many people," he said.

City gets its first high rise

The nine-storey office, shop and theatre building planned by Capella Holdings Ltd. will go ahead.

The building will be on a site partly occupied by Carpet City's store, 435-437 Nepean Highway.

On Monday night Frankston Council voted 8/3 in favor of the city's first high rise building.

Later in the night, councillors commissioned a strategy plan to govern future high rise development in the business sector.

The plan, to be undertaken by council's planner Mr. Yuen Lim or a town planning consultant will cover parking formulae, height limits and surveys to show the need for office space.

This unified approach was suggested by town clerk Mr. George Pentland who said councillors had referred in recent talks to a strategy plan when no such plan had been commissioned.

Council may be able to defer other applications for multi-storey developments if it was preparing overall planning policies for the central business district, said Mr. Pentland.

The Capella project was in doubt when first announced in May because it did not meet car parking requirements set by council.

The company has now agreed to pay council \$202,500 and also provide 52 spaces in a basement car park. The money will be spent on car parking in the business centre.

Capella was represented by Mr. K. Gifford, QC, when it met councillors last Thursday to discuss the project.

The company announced then that a restaurant incorporated

in the original plan had been dropped.

The building will now include a basement car-park, two levels of shops, a level incorporating two theatres and seven floors of offices.

Cr. Geoff Eastwood has given notice of a rescission motion to stop the building.

If the company applies for a building permit before the next meeting of council in two weeks, the rescission will be ineffective because council's decision will have been acted upon.

The building was opposed by town planner Mr. Lim on the grounds that it would "detrimentally affect traffic flow in the business centre" and fail to meet car parking requirements.

Councillors opposing the project—Cr. Eastwood, Max Batchelor and Bob Williamson—accused other councillors of ignoring the town planner's advice.

Cr. Batchelor called for a forward development policy before any decision was made on Capella's application.

Cr. Eastwood opposed developers "being allowed to determine how the city should grow".

Cr. Derek Bunyan said the building would help create more job opportunities in a "city of commuters".

"If more people worked locally, more money would be spent in our shops", he said.

Cr. Bunyan also claimed that the centre's two cinemas would provide entertainment facilities

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THE HELLMUTH APPEAL

So many helped family's dream

The operation the Hellmuths have dreamed about all Neil's life will be performed at the Mayo Clinic in America next April.

Ron and Betty Hellmuth have lived in hope of this chance since Neil was born. They've clung to hope, even when London doctors said it was impossible.

Neil's heart disease has always disadvantaged him. It's been a disability that has set him apart from other children his age. He can't do everything they do, and knows this.

In the field of almost everything physical, he has been a spectator. His heart is working only on half power. But he is a boy of hope and has an unshakable confidence that the operation will fix him up.

His parents are anxious about the operation, but Neil's just full of hope.

There has never been any doubt that Neil would have this operation, and until the soccer club moved in, the Hellmuths were prepared to sell their Karungal home to get the money.

Their friends at the club did not want this to happen, so the appeal began.

When he learned of the appeal plans, Ron Hellmuth said: "Raising the money is a worry and I'd like to say, 'thanks very much, I'll do it myself,' but I have to be realistic."

"There is no place for false pride and I know these people are doing it, not for me, but for Neil."

When the Hellmuth story was first published, the soccer club had raised \$350 and was organising functions to raise more money.

There seemed to be a long way to go at that point, and even the club thought it would be doing well to raise half of the original target of \$6000.

Club president Ron Kirkpatrick was flabbergasted at the response to the appeal.

In a prepared statement he said: "Karungal United Soccer Club, organiser of the Hellmuth Appeal, would like to express its grateful thanks to all those individuals, service and other clubs, churches, schools, shops, factories, members of the soccer fraternity and others who rallied to the club's assistance as soon as Hellmuth's plight became known. Also to those individuals and groups, known and unknown, who ran special projects to help this appeal."

"The Frankston Standard Newswoman, its management,

editorial staff and photographers, is to be commended for its public spirited action in giving the Hellmuth story to the public, and for doing so with discretion.

"The Standard's reporting brought assistance from South Australia, Tasmania, Western Australia, Canberra, and all over Victoria."

"The volume of mail received was staggering, and from a cross-section of the community came donations and messages of reassurance and best wishes for Neil and the Hellmuth Family. We have tried to acknowledge all donations where possible."

"The club feels that Frankston Apex should receive special mention for its mammoth donation of \$1000 and following it up with a further \$500 to buy the two mini bikes donated by Honda Australia when the club found it could not raise them."

"Thanks to the boys of Karungal Soccer Club, officials, managers, coaches, ladies' auxiliary and supporters for the many tasks they undertook to help the appeal. Also to Mr Colin Dickens, Mr Derek Linnell, Mr W De Graaf, J.P., Cr Derek Binnyan for their honorary services to this appeal."

There are many stories associated with the appeal and many of them will remain untold. Help came from everyone, from youngsters to pensioners.

Many people would have had ten-year-olds knocking on their doors, telling them about young Neil who needed an operation.

"There were dozens of kids like that who rose to the occasion," said Mr Kirkpatrick.

The Hellmuths themselves were often stopped by people in the streets—given a donation and best wishes.

There were many letters, like one from the children in Form 104's Ballarat North Technical School which said: "We thought we should give our little donation to you because if you go to so much trouble for your son to even sell your own home knowing you must have worked hard for it, we thought you deserved a little help."

Another from Jackie Filkin, of Sunshine, said: "We have raised \$40 which

doesn't sound much to the thousand dollars that was donated last week, BUT we are still trying to raise even more."

The appeal has achieved what it set out to do . . . and now it is all up to Neil and the doctors.

When Neil and his mother go to America next April they won't be alone.

Mr Bill Edwards, international relations chairman of District 201M of Lions, has said that Lions clubs round Mayo Clinic will host Neil and his mother during their stay in America.

"Club members will meet them when they arrive in America and make sure that they get settled in comfortably and have no problems," Mr Edwards said.

The soccer club said it was grateful to Golden Poultry which discounted chickens for the supper at the dance on Saturday and thanked Kentucky Fried Chicken for cooking them.

Plan for theatre

The Peninsula Light Operatic Society has offered Frankston Council \$5000 toward renovations at Seaford Hall.

The society met council last week with a proposal to transform the hall into "the Theatre, Seaford". Council will discuss the offer and make a decision within a few weeks.

The idea came from a council-owned theatre at Ferntree Gully, transformed by a local theatre group into the "The 1812 Theatre".

Society members told council the theatre is now valued at \$70,000.

PLOS members envisage substantial reconstruction of the existing hall. It would seat about 250 in a theatre with a properly raked floor.

The society would pay \$1000 rent to council for use of the hall three nights a week and probably three seasons a year, which would take up about 12 weekends.

Members told council the theatre would be suitable for large scale theatrical performances, intimate revues, drama, orchestral concerts, ballet, meetings, forums, and cinema.

They claim present use is restricted because the hall's facilities are inadequate.

Peninsula Light Operatic Society spends between \$3000 and \$4000 on a show. Each show has 60 to 80 performers and an orchestra of 20. The number of assistants required make the total involved in each production about 150.

The society has reached a point where it can stage two productions annually of a semi-professional standard.

It is becoming increasingly difficult to have a game of soccer refereed by officials with a concise knowledge of the finer points of the game, and teams employing clever tactics — particularly when playing an offside game, which is a world-recognised method — are being deliberately penalised by referees controlling the game from one half of the field.

In some cases, it must be admitted, the officials in charge are not fit enough to traverse the length and breadth of the field with young players in their teens, and again some just don't really understand the two most important laws of the game that cause trouble at games.

They are: Law 11, which states that a player is offside if he is nearer the opponents' goal-line than the ball at the moment the ball is played unless (a) he is in his own half of the field, (b) there are two of his opponents nearer to their own goal-line than he is. (c) The ball last touched an opponent or was last played by him, (d) he receives the ball direct from a goal kick, corner kick, throw-in or when the ball was 'knocked' by the referee.

Law 12 states that the referee shall not allow a game to be played unless the players are fit to play.

ding' refs through a knowledge of the rules test before allowing them to take control of games that can be won or lost by simply ignoring Law 11 and 16.

Mr Kirkpatrick claimed that two East Ward councillors had voted in favor of allowing the horse show at Ballam

park after telling club officials that they would oppose such a move.

He said it appeared that Mayor Cr Derek Bunyan and Cr Harold Kendall-Wigley missed the horse show application which was submitted with the whole festival program for an en bloc decision by council.

Mr Kirkpatrick said the Lions Club had co-operated by asking the club which areas were to be roped off from the horses.

"However, there were not enough marshals to properly police the protected areas around the goal mounds," he said.

"Now, the peninsula's best soccer pitch is badly scarred. There is a virtual circular trench up to 4 inches deep where horses ran round and round".
