Frankston's Splendid Victory

Frankston proved to an enthusiastic crowd of supporters that they have the ability and fighting spirit to beat all comers by their four-goal defeat of Slavia on Saturday last.

Frankston kicked off under perfect football conditions and for fifteen minutes the game flowed to and fro with neither attacking force able to break through the opposing defence. Then came the home side's first goal, scored by the vice captain, P. Ims.

Shortly afterwards Frankston had to re-organise its tea after the captain, O. Piggott received a badly cut eye which necessitated medical attention. Undaunted by their setback, Frankston continued attacking and were rewarded when C Davenport put in a perfect shot which gave the goalkeeper no chance.

In the second half Slavia tried hard to score but failed to make any impression on the solid Frankston defence. The play became rather robust and the home side was awarded a free kick from just outside the penalty area. The ball came to P. Ims who again made no mistake scoring his second goal, putting Frankston three up.

PURDON INJURED

At this juncture Frankston side lost the services of its new outside left, A. Purdon, who was injured. Even against nine men Slavia failed to break through and had a penalty awarded against them. This led to a controversy which held up the game for some minutes. When it was eventually taken the ball went over the bar, which under the circumstances was probably just as well.

The captain returned to the field despite stitches in his eye, and a pass from him led to Frankston's fourth goal, scored by P. Mergan. No more goals were scored but the whole team are deserving of nothing but praise for the way in which they played together and individually. For a long period they ledged only nine men, which might well have spelt disaster to a team possessing less grit and determination. As every man played so well it is invidious to single out any player for special praise.

The entertaining football

and the extremely satisfactory result must in some measure be credited to the enthusiastic crowd of supporters, who helped to inspire the home team to a well deserved victory. On Saturday's showing Frankston can face their future games with complete confidence and will doubtless be treated with great respect by their future opponents.

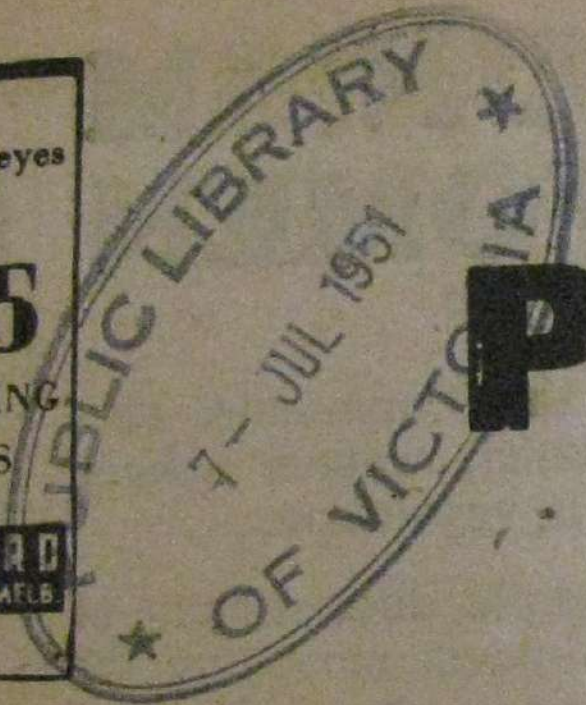

Church News

SEAFORD COMMUNITY CHURCH

BUILDING EXTENSION
The progress of the Seaford Community Church is to be seen in the fact that, although the first service and Sunday School was held only fifteen months ago, work has already commenced on the extension of the building to double its size.

This has been made possible by voluntary support, by direct contributions and other social activities of its members. Money is still needed for inside fittings and furnishings, but the minister, Rev. W. Bottomley, is confident that this will be forthcoming in time to meet the cost.

The extension is particularly needed for the work of the Sunday School. Through lack of accommodation classes for the older pupils have had to be held in the open air, but with the advent of wintry conditions, this is no longer possible.

An interesting feature, probably unique in Australia, is that it has been proved possible for people of many different denominational origins to come together on a free and undogmatic basis, united on the principle of the worship of God and the service of man. Keen interest in this experiment is being shown by many people far outside this particular area. Seaford may yet have the distinction of pointing the way to a true religious unity, with tolerance and understanding in place of division.
