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

The First Line Of Defence

RECENTLY we have put our national signature to three important documents.

We have signed a peace treaty, and, with it, we pass officially from a state of war to a state of peace with Japan. We take on the responsibilities of peace—neighbourliness, co-operation and goodwill towards the late enemy.

We have subscribed to the Colombo Plan to raise living standards and social welfare in the countries of South East Asia. Not only do we promise to help fill the rice bowls of our neighbours, but we offer them educational and technical assistance. In these ways we hope to guide their awakening nationalism along the path of democracy.

We are partners in the Pacific Pact. With America and New Zealand we are bound to mutual assistance in the face of aggression.

These three far-reaching obligations are made at a time when a serious position has arisen in Australia. This, the land of wide open spaces, is running short of food. To us, who learnt in the schoolroom of our country as a great primary producing land, even talk of such a possibility has an element of the fantastic.

However, the hard reality of facts and figures forces us to the realisation that we have neglected our agriculture, and this neglect has caught up with us. Only an imaginative and vigorous rural policy can save us.

Taking a gloomy view and considering the prospect of a future war, we are faced with the chance of Australia's position being determined by our ability to produce food. Equipment may become outmoded, food never. Agriculture should be the basis of our defence programme. No effort should be spared to make the land available to new settlers or to offset labour shortages by the introduction of migrants to rural life.

As well as this injection of new blood into the farming community, taxation should not discourage the farmer so that he and his sons leave the land. A high priority for essential agricultural materials, and irrigation schemes that will bring water to the soil, are vital to a realistic defence programme.

To pull our weight in any major conflict we need men trained in the use of modern equipment. We need, too, the ability to feed our civilian population, our armies and those of our allies, who will look to us as to their granary. Food production is the corner stone of our peacetime economy and our primary strategic value in war.

Mornington Shire Council

The Mornington Shire Council held its monthly ordinary meeting at the Court House last Friday under the chairmanship of the president, Cr. J. O. Watt.

Those in attendance were Crs. Leggatt, Kirton, Morell, Nunn, Field, Wilson, Roberts, Barringer, Dorrington, Ferrero, and Mr. L. T. McLaren (Shire Secretary) and Mr. ... (Shire engineer).

Cr. Leggatt will represent the Mornington Shire at a conference at Frankston next Friday of other suburban municipalities concerning water supply and reticulation.

At the request of the War Memorial Appeal Committee, council will inquire into the cost of proceeding with a beautification scheme at the Monument.

A sub-committee of the council will meet the Chamber of Commerce to discuss matters of mutual concern when such a meeting is requested.

Cr. Nunn moved, in reply to a request of Main Street

ratepayers, that temporary measures to alleviate the drainage problem in this area be undertaken and some repairs made to the entrance to Foam Street, pending the reconstruction of Main Street.

A majority of property owners in Wakers Street, Mt. Eden, has asked Council to change the name of their street to Kartella Lane, and their request has been granted.

Mornington Scout Group has permission to affix a water pipe to the stand pipe on Balaarring Road to serve the Scout camp.

In Victoria twenty-one trades come under the jurisdiction of the Apprenticeship Commission and only one, the electrical mechanics' trade, has a sufficiency of apprentices.

One of the greatest difficulties in keeping young people to their craft tuition is the long term of their training.

On the Peninsula the difficulties of apprenticeship are underlined by the lack of technical educational facilities. Long exhausting travel to Caulfield or Richmond or other metropolitan colleges for the necessary instruction deters many a young boy or girl from pursuing a trade or profession.

APPRENTICESHIP PROBLEMS

This is Apprenticeship Week, and the emphasis is laid on Australia's need for skilled men and women in the community. Our industrial expansion and our defence programme both demand the maintenance of a force of artisans.

Unfortunately, thousands of young Victorians are turning to "dead-end," unskilled work which, temporarily, commands high wages, rather than to learning a trade or profession.

The spirit of craftsmanship, the pride of the worker in the finished product of his labor, is essential to the success of an apprenticeship system.

Cr. Leggatt, president of the Mornington Shire Council, said that the establishment of a technical school to cater for the needs of the Mornington Peninsula would be welcomed.

If Government finance could not provide schools, the answer to the problem could well lie in the private technical school set up, perhaps by the cooperative effort of the Peninsula shires.

The idea of a private institution might interest professional men and tradesmen who are retired and live on the Peninsula.

In Frankston, a group known as the Guild of Craftsmen has been formed and this might be the nucleus of a technical training school.





ROSEBUD STREET CONSTRUCTION

The estimated average cost per lot in a scheme of contribution for the construction of a pipe storm water sewer to drain low lying areas in Rosebud, bounded by Jetty Road, Spray Street, Seal Street and McDowell Street, and the construction of McDowell and Gipps Streets, and portions of Spray, Barry and Foam Streets, Rosebud Parade, and Mt. Arthur Road is as follows:

Road construction and sewer, £118 per lot; road construction, kerb and channel and sewer, £178; drainage only, £75.

The total cost is expected to be in the vicinity of

RED HILL MEMORIAL

Council agreed to subscribe on £1 for £1 basis towards the cost of the combined war memorial and infant welfare centre for Red Hill-Main Ridge district.

DROMANA DRAINAGE

McCRAE DRAINAGE STREET CONSTRUCTION

Owners will be pleased that plans and specifications have been prepared for construction of drainage easement for Beverley Road and Crae, and a section of Beverley Road and Street. The proposal includes clearing, surfacing, sealing and channelling of 450 feet of Beverley Road. Estimated cost is £167 per block fronting Street, and £167 per block fronting Road.

COUNCIL ELECTIONS

A suggestion by the council man that polling for council elections should be changed from the Thursday in August to Saturday following was deferred for further discussion. 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
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


