(By C. COLEMAN)

Last week I spoke of success through practice.

Eleven stars, no matter how brilliant, do not necessarily make a good team.

What makes a good team? The answer is simple—co-operation—a union of persons striving for the same goal.

Officials and players must be unselfish. Team spirit is half the battle.

How does it affect the players? They must play as a team.

Individual gain is out. You cannot function without the help of the other ten, so do not try. Execute the moves that the coach teaches because the rest of the team know what to expect.

Do not grumble if the position you are selected for is not your favourite. Abide by the referee's decisions, although you may not agree.

Never grumble or blame a team mate for mistakes, but do your best to rectify them.

Obey instructions given by the captain during play. These are for improvements and not uttered for the pleasure of hearing himself speak.

Remember, a game is neither won nor lost until the final whistle.

Do your best for the full 90 minutes; you owe it to your supporters who brave all weathers to cheer you on.

Above all, be a good sportsman. Win if you can but play the game always.

## SOCCER HINTS

(By C. COLEMAN)

We have dealt with practice and team building. Let us study the eleven positions — their object and method of fulfilment.

First, the goal-keeper. He is the last line of defence and a mistake means a goal. He must learn to narrow the angle of approach for an opposing forward, which gives him (the forward) the smallest target possible. He must try to anticipate shots, keep the body behind the ball and catch cleanly.

When clearing, kick or throw to an unmarked team mate and not as far and hard as you can—be constructive, have a perfect understanding with the full-backs, for corner kicks, centres and free kicks, when you, and not they, go up for the ball. This saves misunderstandings. Always keep your eyes on the ball and not the feet of an advancing forward.

Best practice: Eight or nine players on the edge of the penalty area with half a dozen balls driving them hard and fast from all angles and varying heights.

## SOCCER HINTS

(By C. COLEMAN)

Full-backs: Your main job  
is to oppose wingmen. In  
modern soccer, wingmen are  
usually selected for speed,  
so full-backs should be able  
to tackle strongly, recover  
with speed, kick and head  
the ball accurately

Positional play reduces  
the danger of fast thrusts  
down the wing, so keep  
yourself between the goal  
and the opponent.

Never tackle too far up-  
field, because if you are  
beaten the opponent has a  
clear run to goal. It is  
better to run with him and  
force him toward the touch  
line. This gives other de-  
fenders time to get into  
position for a centre.

For throw-ins make sure  
you are behind your man  
and ready to intercept a  
short throw, or beat him in  
the race for a long one.

The art in a tackle is to  
make your opponent go the  
way you want, feint left and  
tackle hard and fast on the  
right or vice-versa. Do not  
use the same trick all the  
time.

These movements have to  
blend so practice it during  
training. Play as far up  
your own half as is prac-  
tical, and note the positions  
of players, then should you  
intercept the ball or rob an  
opponent you'll know exactly  
where to place it to advan-  
tage.

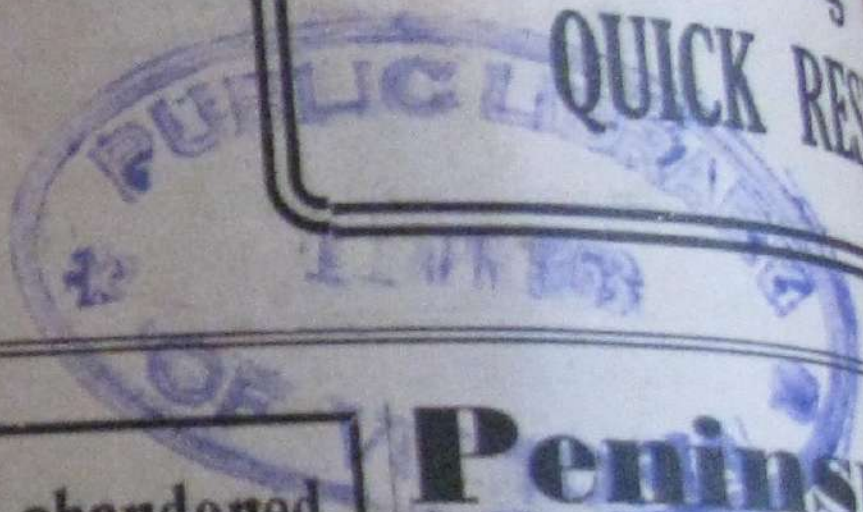

## SOCCER HINTS

(By Colin Coleman)

### Half-backs

These are key players. You have to break opponents' attacks and your own forward attack, take the throw a lot of the free kicks accurately placing either with your feet is essential to the success of half-backs.

You have to be very cover all the ground. There are three half-backs in a team, centre half, right half and left half.

The centre half's main job is to mark the centre forward. The rule is to stick close to him but between him and his own goal. He then gets past you to get a shot for goal.

Left and right half side forwards are the players you must mark; they are usually schemers and they use their wits. Tackling is their main job and you must be good at it. Make use of crossfield passes to opposite wingmen. They catch your opponent the wrong foot when in possession of the ball. Get an opponent out of play before you pass. They create an opening for the forwards.

The ball will come from all angles and heights. You must keep it under control. After a quick throw free kick has caught opponents out of play take full advantage. Don't just stand with your hair in place.

## SOCCER HINTS

(By Colin Coleman)

**Forwards:** There are five in the team, right and left wing, inside right and left, and centre forward. It is their job to score goals.

When any one of these has intercepted or received a pass he must gain as much ground as possible.

The others should run into the open spaces, keep on side, and be ready to receive a pass, and so manoeuvre the defence out of position.

**Wingmen:** These men should be fast and able to centre the ball accurately at full speed, either high or low. They must place corner kicks so that it would be dangerous for the keeper to run out to intercept, must be able to decide when to cut in for goal or to draw another defender out of position before passing.

**Centre forward:** Main goal scoring forward, should be able to use either foot or head with power, and accuracy, and from any position or angle, must be unselfish and distribute the ball wisely. Do not wander. The goal is in the middle of the bye line and other forwards are doing their best to get the ball there, so make sure you ARE in position to slam it home.

**Inside Forwards:** These are the schemers. They make the most of the openings for either wingmen or centre forward, they also help in defence. They cover a lot of ground, so, needless to say, must be very fit. They must be able to use both feet and head and have good ballcontrol, be able to feint and dribble, and so create gaps in a defence.

All forwards should chase every loose ball, no matter how futile it may seem. This applies particularly to wingmen and centre forward.

## SOCCER HINTS

(By Colin Coleman)

I have discussed team building and the fundamental requirements of each position.

When you get eleven players who, by natural ability, or by hard practice and training, fulfil these requirements, you can then further develop them into a first rate team by teaching the forwards inter-changing of positions during attacks, and defenders a system of covering one another in defence.

You may hear of a lot of pre-match plans worked out on a blackboard, such as "M" or "W," or whatever coaches care to call them. They are only formations of defence or attack.

It is practically impossible to play to set plans because you have eleven players opposing you who have a very definite say in the matter too.

You have to develop a football brain for yourself.

There are always weak spots in a team. It is up to you to pick them and exploit them to the full.

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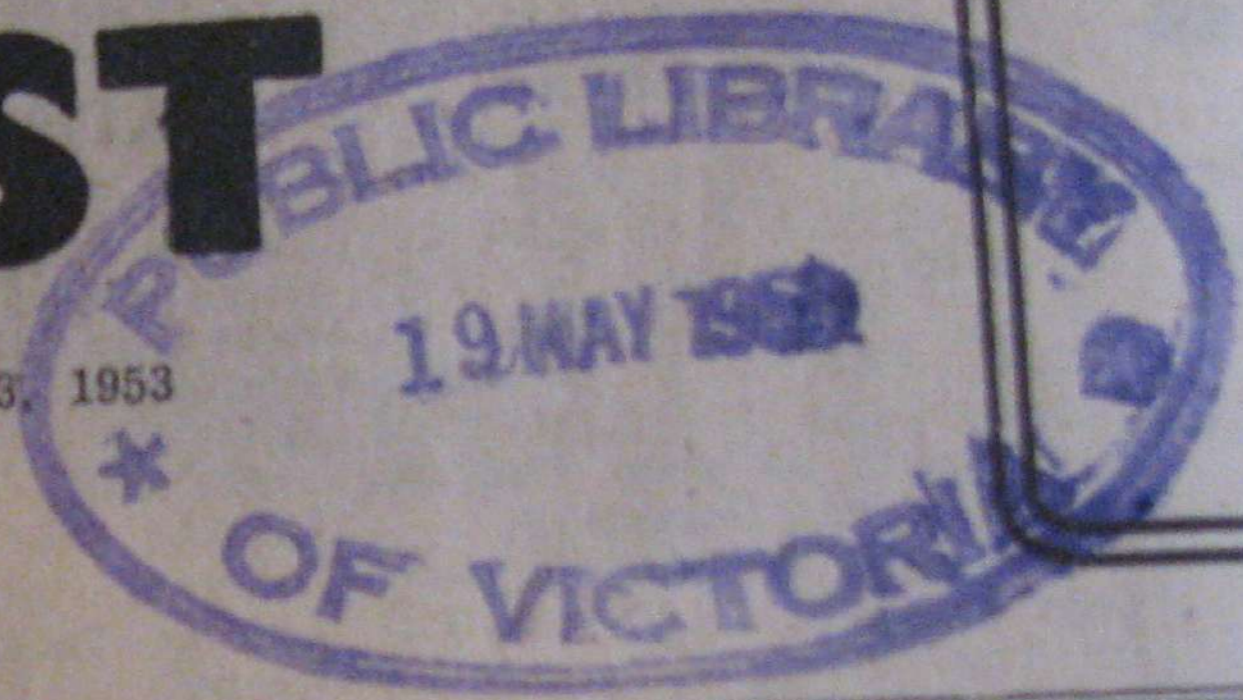

The shire secretary will submit a further report to the council, setting out the ways and means of overcoming the bus stopping problem without prohibiting parking altogether.

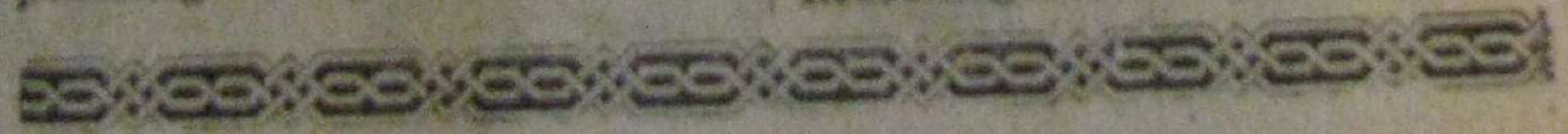
### OBITUARY

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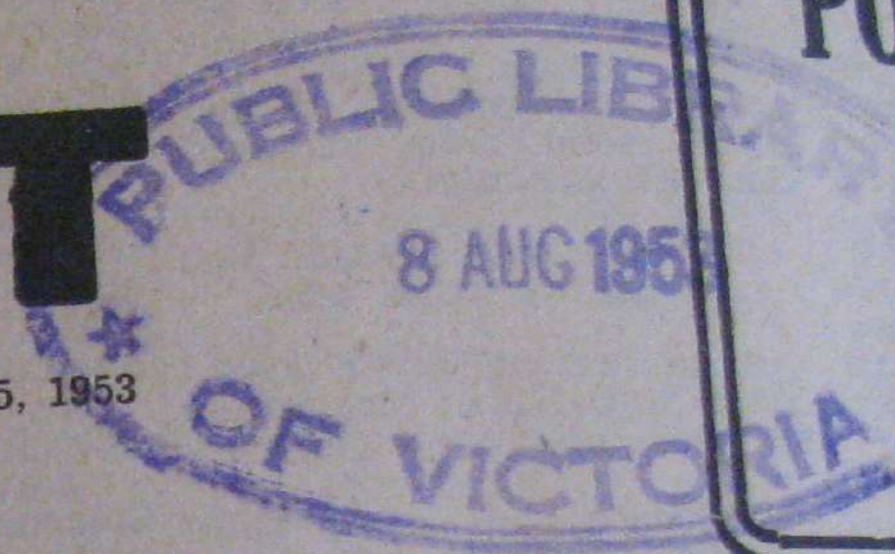
