Just over 100 years ago a German Social organisation called the Tivoli was formed. Split into various sections it caters for singers, chess players, shooting, and other sporting activities. In 1954 a soccer section was added to the Tivoli. Immediately the club became a strength in Victorian soccer, many top German players in Australia joined the club.

The club reached State League level on two occasions, and many of their players appeared in the German National colours in the old set up of International matches. THE REFEREE REPLIES

- Answer 1 Indirect free kick (i.e.) a kick from which a goal cannot be scored unless touched by another player.
- Answer 2 Nine (i) Handling the ball (ii) Pushing an opponent (iii) striking or attempting to strike an opponent (iv) kicking or attempting to kick an opponent (v) holding an opponent with part of arm or hand (vi) jumping at an opponent (vii) charging an opponent in a violent or dangerous manner (viii) charging an opponent from behind unless he is obstructing (ix) tripping an opponent.

 Note: All above offences must be committed inside the penalty area, and must be intentional as interpreted by the referee.
