SYSTEMS

Most teams these days play some sort of system, usually 424 or 434. Have you ever wondered how these different systems developed? The first formation back in the 19th Century when the game first began, had 9 forwards, a defender and a goalkeeper. The game was then played in bowler hats and long trousers. As the skill developed in players, more defensive cover was required. The Scots took the credit for introducing the 226 system. 2 backs. 2 haves and 6 forwards. At Cambridge in 1883 the students developed the pyramid system, the 235, which was the most popular used until fairly recently. In 1925 a change in the offside rule gave an idea to Herbert Chapman of the Arsenal to develop the 3 full back system, more commonly known as the WM because of its formation on the field. The Swiss Bolt system was the first to introduce a sweeper and used 5 forwards and 4 defenders in front of the sweeper. The clever Hungarian line up of recent years reversed the WM and introduced a deep lying centre forward and wingers which helped them trounce England 6-3 at Wembley and later 7-1 in Budapest. The Brazilians accidently came across the 424 when they found that they had a deep lying inside forward in DIDI and use attacking wing half in ZITO to form the middle pair in a system, pt.

that was to bring them great success. A further development of this was the 433, probably the most widely used today, was adapted by the English and helped them win the World Cup in 1966. Systems depend upon the players intelligence, technical ability and condition and with the continuous improvement in the game today one wonders what will come next.

At Altona, after we had defeated them 2-1 earlier this season, their Coach admitted being baffled by our system which was none of those mentioned above, but a 442. But not to give any secrets away, we have now changed it. Any guesses?

BAXTER STADIUM

It is hoped within a couple of years we may make a giant stride in the history of our Club. All being well and negotiations over successfully, we could be playing in one of the finest stadiums in the Victorian Soccer scene. The basic conception of Baxter Stadium is a high speed. Greyhound track encircling a full size Soccer pitch and training area. Facilities that will be provided include stand with seating for 2000. Entry to stand will be at high level similar to the VFL ground at Waverley. Dressing rooms, showers, etc. treatment room, referee & Committee rooms will be at the back of the stand. A Restaurant will be built at back of the stand and can also be used as a covered training area. Full broadcasting facilities are available. A greyhound track will be constructed similar to Harold Park in Sydney and of sand. This will produce the fastest track in Victoria. Track will be floodlit on a dual basis so that night Soccer can be played. Also a floodlit training area. An embankment will be built to enclose the greyhound track, the main soccer pitch being placed directly in front of the stand with an embankment on the side and one end similar to Olympic Park. Ground will accommodate 20,000 and it is intended to extend the covered area to about half the embankment. Parking accommodation available for 10.000 cars. When complete, this will give our Club one of the best grounds in the State and we must make every effort to be worthy of it both on and off the field.
