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PLAYER PROFILE

PETER HORTON

Our senior team is having a lot of success this year and one of the individual successes is the current excellent form of our striker Peter Horton. Twelve goals so far this season and obviously more to come, this must go down as his best season yet.

Peter was born in Frankston in August 1956 and apart from a couple of years working in South Australia, he has lived here for most of the time. His first seven years at school were at Frankston East Primary until 1968 and this was followed by four years at Frankston Technical School.

It was also in 1968 that he started playing soccer and that was as a junior with Karingal. Towards the end of the previous year, his parents, Don and Bonny Horton, were busy being founder members of the club. As soon as the first ever junior season at Karingal was about to start, they had signed up their two sons, Peter and Gary, ready to play.

Peter's first season was with the Under 12 team, coached by Ted Thornton, and that year they took out the Rigby Cup. The next year he moved up to the Under 14's, again coached by Ted Thornton and this time the team was successful in winning the league.

This bright start to his soccer career came to an abrupt halt when a bad knee injury kept him out of the game for two seasons, but Peter bounced back again in 1972 to be a member of the Under 16 team [representing Melbourne in the State League Colts], scoring a total of 36 goals, and finishing Runners Up in the league. The team was coached by Barry Bolton - as was the Under 17's, the following year - Peter's last as a junior.

In 1973, Peter left school and started working as a Total driveway attendant. He stayed there for a couple of years before taking off on an eight month "round Australia" trip through all of the states [except W.A.]. In 1976, he took up a position as Service Station Manager for Solo Petroleum in South Australia. Back in Victoria in 1979, Peter joined Skyland Concreting and has been with them ever since.

Peter's senior soccer career started in 1974 the year Karingal first broke into senior soccer. The team was coached by Derek Millman for a time, then Dave Ancell. He didn't play soccer at all during 1976-77-78 while he was travelling and living interstate. He came back for one season in the Reserves under coach Ron Owens in 1979, had another blank year in 1980, and then back with a real force this year. The five great goals against East Brunswick show the great form he is having at the present.

Peter must be one of Karingal's more popular members - he is certainly known by many junior and senior supporters. He has always been a Karingal man and probably always will be. It's not surprising, therefore, that he would like to see more junior players coming through to the senior ranks. He feels this would keep the club united and give the seniors strength and stability.

CLUB PERSONALITY

ROY McLAREN

An essential part of any sporting club is a hard working social committee and in our club no one works harder at this than our social Vice-President, Roy McLaren. Capable of organising almost any event, usually cool and unruffled, and a source of seemingly unlimited useful contacts, we often wonder at times just how we would get on without him.

Roy is a Londoner - born in Lewisham in 1929 and living mostly in the South East of the city during his years in U.K. Deptford until 1938, Bellingham until 1951, then Bromley, Selhurst Park and finally, Addiscombe in Surrey. His schooling was mainly at Deptford Park and the John Roam School for Boys, with a collection of other schools during the early war years when only a few schools were open.

In 1946, Roy left school and started working on the waterside at Hayswharf. It didn't last long, though, because the next year he went into the R.A.F. and he stayed there until 1950. On one occasion, during this time, four somewhat green R.A.F. men chatted up four girls on the London Underground between London Bridge and Angel. Six of them faded away into obscurity, but two of them - Doreen and Roy - remained permanently chatted! In 1951, they were married at St. Barnaba's Church in Downham. It was a momentous occasion! The British Government declared a public celebration [they preferred to call it "Festival of Britain"] and the young vicar who had officiated must have been so overcome by it all, that two weeks later he took up a post on the isolated Island of Tristan Da Cunha in the Atlantic Ocean!

At the time of the wedding, Roy was employed on Gun Wharf, Wapping and he stayed there until 1952 before taking up cargo superintending and bulk oil surveying on ships and tankers. In 1959 he moved on and went into the stockbroking business where he remained right up until 1963.

While he was living in U.K., Roy didn't have any direct involvement in soccer. He supported Bromley in the Isthmian League for a time and then later Crystal Palace.

Doreen and Roy left England in July 1963 and travelled to Australia on board the Fairsky. They lived in Brighton at first before finally settling in Frankston in 1967. Roy kept up his work in the stockbroking industry until 1974, when he went into his present chicken business in Frankston.

Roy and Doreen first became involved with Karingal Soccer Club through Eleanor and Charlie McNeill selling dance and raffle tickets to friends. Some of our old club members may recall a function at the Police and Citizens Hall when a group [including Doreen and Roy] turned up wearing long white Kaftans with flowers over them, unshaved, barefooted and hair uncombed - as the 'Peace People'.

Roy decided to join the club, went along to pay his subs and finished up as Secretary at the foundation meeting of the Red Devils Social Club. The following year he was elected President of the Social Club. He dropped out for a year and then came back as Vice President Social on the Club's Executive Committee.

He has a number of other interests which include being a member of the Somerville Hotel Darts Team, fishing when possible and eating out at different restaurants - especially if chicken is NOT on the menu. Just recently, though there hasn't been much time for that, what with his business, the soccer club and finishing off a recently acquired house.

Let us hope Roy never becomes too busy that he can't fit in his work with the soccer club. He would be a hard man to replace.

ROY'S VIEW OF THE FUTURE.

As an individual who has not really been involved with senior soccer and having no boys playing junior soccer, I suppose it is possible for me to have unbiased views of both sides of the club.

In the past, there always seemed to be a certain amount of feeling between the factions - seniors and juniors - after all, the club was originally a junior club and some people even felt the clubs should be split. I think that, for the first time over the past five years, we are now really acting as one club and that is how I would like to see the future of the club.

There is always room for improvement. I would like to see improvement of facilities in the clubhouse, a cover put over the area outside the club and lots of smaller items - I believe we will get these things.

A successful senior team attracts more support which means more money for improvements. It also serves as a goal for junior players, to entice them to stay with the club and not be poached away by other clubs dangling promises which are not kept.

Members should try to keep in mind that whoever serves on the Executive Committee is a volunteer doing their best. If anybody has a gripe they should talk to a committee member to get whatever it is corrected, and in their turn committee members should keep in mind that they are elected by the members and be prepared to listen to suggestions put forward by members.

The future of Karingal? Easy - a happy united club with a happy united membership - after all, isn't that what it's supposed to be about.

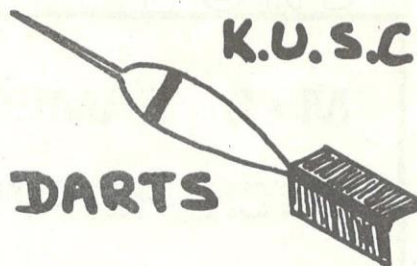
Now that we have the new stereo-system, we are giving consideration to the next purchase out of the raffle money.
