SECRETARY'S REPORT

June 21st must go down as a very black day for the Devils. I filled the Results Report that evening which showed four losses, no goals for and 22 against. In my long association with the club, I cannot remember seeing such a Result Report, which leads me to wonder what is going wrong. I realise of course, that that Report contains only the Under 11's to Under 14's. The younger age groups results not being reportable and the Under 15's having a bye. I note also that the current league position of those teams is fourth, second, fourth and fifth. We also probably have the lowest number of junior players in the club this year than we have had for a number of years. I can think of a number of reasons for the position we find ourselves in, but I would be pleased to hear from anyone who thinks they can supply some reasons and more importantly some remedies that may improve the problem.

Last month, I spent a holiday in New Zealand during which time, I had a bit of a look at soccer there. In fact, I probably saw more soccer over there in three weeks than I see here in three months. What with two F.A.Cup games and three World Cup Qualifying games, all on T.V., plus a couple of local games. I consider the standard of New Zealand World Cup team to be high but the local game standard is low. I watched their equivalent of our State league and the standard was very low. I consider the standard seen at Ballan Park on a Saturday afternoon to be higher and much better supported. I saw one game supported by 24 spectators and another supported by only 18. The grounds were good with large enclosed stadiums, but wasted. Here at Karingal we could do wonders with such facilities. Certainly, we have the supporters to make more use of them than the New Zealanders do. Anyone who feels that there is something lacking at Karingal should look closely at any New Zealand club and then think again. Not that this is any reason for complacency at Karingal, it isn't. We must all of us strive at all times to improve our club. This can only be done by each and everyone of us, Committee, Managers, Coaches, Players, Members and parents supporting the club to the best of their ability, recommending changes and improvements, pointing out problems, and helping to solve those problems. Don't criticise the club among yourselves. The Committee wants to know what you think is wrong. Only by telling us can we make the necessary improvements.

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PLAYER PROFILES

BOB DELANEY.

Soccer can be a serious business especially when a league title is at stake. There is no doubting that Bob Delaney is taking his game seriously this year, but fortunately he still has a sense of humour and is usually on hand with a quick joke to suit most occasions - an asset to any club.

Bob was born in Stretford, Manchester in 1954 and it was probably the only bright spark in a rather gloomy year for United fans since they did not win a single trophy that year. While he was living in Stretford he attended St. Hughes Primary, then St. Bede's College in Manchester. He played soccer all through school and when he was 16 he joined Old Traffordians in the Lancashire and Cheshire League.

In 1972, Bob started work as a salesman for the stainless steel company, Miles Druce and then the next year he moved to Dart Container-line. In 1974, he got a great urge to travel and worked for the Canadian National Railways. He didn't see a lot of Canada though since he was working in the Manchester branch of the company.

In May of 1974, Bob got married and a few months later, obviously tired of watching Manchester United in Second Division, he and his wife travelled to Australia to make a new home for themselves. They settled in Frankston as soon as they arrived out here and within a year Bob had joined Karingal United Soccer Club, where he has been playing ever since, under such coaches as Dave Ancell, Barry Bolton, Kurt Schroeder, Ron Owens, Frank Catlin and now Nigel Bevis and Alen Lewis.

Bob has taken on a number of jobs over the years in Australia with - Myer Frankston [1975], Double R Discounts [1976], McLeod Tyres [1977], John Darcy [1978] and now at present he is with Rank General Electric.

In 1978, he remarried and moved from Frankston to Mornington and then in 1980 he moved to his present house in Chelsea. Bob has one son that he knows of - and that is Keith who is now two years old. As well as playing soccer for Karingal and working, he manages to squeeze in the occasional game of squash and he enjoys watching football.

Bob is in his seventh year as a senior player with Karingal and this year there has been a certain determination to play his way into the first team. His interest in our club does not stop at just being a player, since he often attends social functions and often comes to the club on Friday evenings.

Bob believes that promotion is the main aim of any senior club and that we have the potential now to obtain promotion for this year and go on and build from there. If we get plenty of effort from everyone connected with the club, we can ensure our success for future years. That way we will keep players at the club who in turn will help to coach the juniors and assist them right through to the seniors in the years to come.

SLAVCO RADIC

It is always good to find senior players who have come through the junior ranks at Karingal. Slavco Radic is one such loyal player.

Slavco was born in 1958 in Kljeveci in South West Yugoslavia. Three years later the family moved to Futog in Serbia and they lived there for the next ten years.

In 1965, he started school and at about the same time got interested in soccer. Five years later, in 1970 they moved again, this time to Sydney, Australia, and for the next 15 months they lived in migrant hostels, such as Bonegilla and Villawood in N.S.W. Slavco played his first competitive soccer with Homebush High School and he represented the school at junior level.

In 1972, the family came to Melbourne and settled in Frankston. Slavco attended Karingal High School and also joined Karingal U/14's. Gary Horton was also a member of that team, and they finished up second in the league and runners up in the Cup. The next year he played for the Under 15's and they also finished second.

One of Slavco's busiest years in soccer was 1974. He was playing for Karingal United Under 16's, Karingal High School's team that was Victorian champions and also Karingal's Seniors or Reserves on Sundays and he carried the school and senior soccer on into 1975.

In 1976 Slavco passed his H.S.C. but before leaving High School, he played in the school team that won the Victorian Championship and went on to be runners up in the Australian Championships. He decided that year, to have a break from the senior side and played for Karingal's Under 20 team alongside players like Andy Long and Nigel Plaskett.

The following year Slavco entered a Fine Arts Course at Caulfield Institute of Technology but towards the end of the year he went back to Yugoslavia and stayed there until early 1980. While he was there, he was in the army for 15 months, then attended a University to study English Literature and Language. One highlight of his trip to Yugoslavia was a visit from Gary Horton while he was in the army in Slovenia.

He returned to Australia in 1980 and, until recently, worked for Pub Squash. At the moment, Slavco is unemployed [anyone with any offers should contact him at the club]. He also got right back into soccer at Karingal - last season under Jimmy Logan and this season under Alen Lewis.

Slavco feels that as a club, we have come a long way over the years - some proof is our new clubrooms, but we still need a lot of work and a lot of sensible work from all the members. If we get that, then he can see us easily following the path of Frankston Pines.

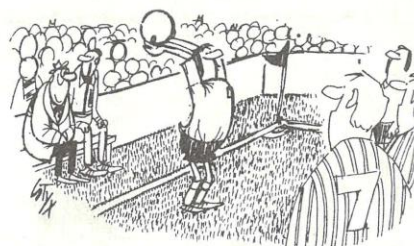

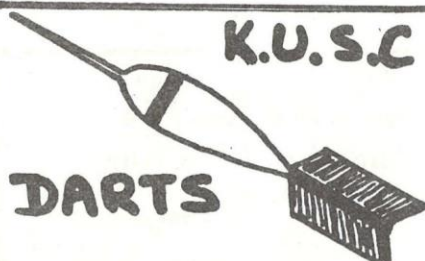

WHY A CLUB CO-OP?

Yes, our club does have a Co-op. In fact, without it, our comfortable club rooms may never have been built.

In the early days of the club, older members and their youngsters used to shelter from the wintry weather in an old wooden hut that was THE club room. Later the Frankston Council 'lent' the club an old weatherboard house where members had the luxury of two small rooms to change and a larger room that doubled for a bar and social room. Somehow the accommodation was cramped, but at times cosy.

Early in 1975, after several abortive attempts, the club management of the day finally got their financial act together and were ready to start building our present club house. The Club formed a Co-operative Society in order to obtain a guaranteed \$18,000 loan from the State Savings Bank.

With the help of a \$20,000 grant from the Frankston City Council, some extra dollars from the club funds and a few thousand dollars worth of sweat and toil by members workers, the club house was built in 1976.

The Co-op, is run by five directors, who are responsible to the Registrar of Co-operative Societies for the proper running of the Society. Present directors are Ron Hellmuth, Peter Hull, Graham Plaskett, Ron Owen and Graham Towers. If you see these characters in a huddle every couple of months, you know they are having one of their famous eight minute meetings!

So when you see in the Club Treasurer's Annual Report payments of \$2,800 a year to the Co-op, you'll know that we are still paying off the \$13,276.90 still owing on the loan.

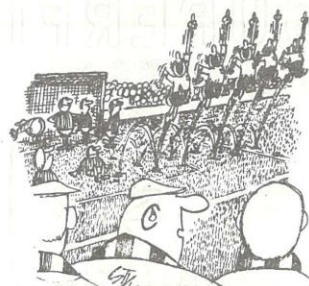
