- SENIORS -

With this final report for the 1981 season I would like to acknowledge the players that have achieved 3rd place on the league table, together with some statistics on this season's performance, in a hope that somebody might understand the frustrations of coaching.

JOHN BAIRD

Gave us many brilliant games, quite often when we needed them most. An agile, strong and confident keeper who can be satisfied with his contribution except perhaps in the training arena which causes a mid season lapse of form.

TOMMY WEIR

Showed why he is the fastest man in the squad with many exciting attacking runs from the full back position and strong recovery in defence. Tom played every game but one and had a sound season, barring one game at Hawthorn where he forgot the way he was playing.

BOB BRICKLEY

Selected as captain for his determined manner, Bob never let up for the entire season with his aggressive, never say die, style. After a shaky start, settled down for a superb 2nd half of the season which saw him getting many votes, from his full 25 games.

NIGEL PLASKETT

Would have been better suited in an attacking position, however necessity found him at centre back for most of the season where he performed with his usual forceful, attacking style with success. Second top scorer with 12 goals, eight of which were from the penalty spot, which shows great confidence from a 21 year old. One careless miss however cost a draw at Brunswick.

ROY BROOKS

Roy came to Karingal from Langwarrin to play out his career in the reserves. He ended up playing every senior game, one of only two players to do so, and then grumbled when rested for a half at Lalor. A disciplined and distinctive season out of position at centre back.

PETER BOURNE

Had a wretched year with injury and managed only 14 games, many of which were of a high standard. We were very fortunate to have him available, and even though only half fit, showed us superb control and powerful long range passing that is a rarity in the game today, and a delight to watch. His only goal came against Lalor when he controlled a chest high pass and volleyed a great waist high shot with symphonic ease and unstoppable power past an astonished keeper.

STEVE CARGILL

Was another to suffer many injuries and had a frustrating season that got him only 17 games. Always a first choice midfielder, Steve gave great value with enormous workrate and involvement, probably the quickest player over 10 yards in the club, eight more games from him would have been invaluable.

ALAN PARROTT

Came to the club three games after the league season had begun, and as assistant coach, gave an excellent example on the field and invaluable advice, off the field. Alan has always been a graceful and talented player and a great entertainer. This season was no different and his neat skilled football and powerful shooting must have pleased everybody.

IAN LESLIE

Only managed 9 games after transferring from Langwarrin but filled a gaping hole at left midfield, high workrate and running made him a first eleven choice. Injury cost Ian 5 games.

ANDY TAYLOR

Also managed 9 games only, but was showing brilliant form late in the season. Andy proved to be a dangerous attacker who can take men on and finish. A full season from him may have been very interesting indeed.

PETER HORTON

Had a great season in his usual courageous fashion, 19 goals is very satisfactory for any striker, how he got many of them was something else. The 5 games he scored against Brunswick was from a performance bordering on herioc, Peter goes where angels fear to tread, and deserved every single goal and possibly many more.

STEVE TAYLOR

Came to us at the half way stage of the season and gave us good support in attack. This gutsy, tough player is exceptional in the air where he may have liked better service, considering a two year lay off, a good season.

MARTYN SAUNDERS

After a brilliant start combined well with Peter Horton in a striking duo that was quite capable and dangerous. In combination with Peter scored over half of the teams goals.

TONY MACKAY

Supported the first team well with 10 games and showed the excellent skills he has always had, Tony only came down to keep fit.

Came on many times to fill a position vacated through injury and when selected performed admirably, particularly as mid field defender which suited his tough nuggety style.

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PROFILE ALEN LEWIS

Much has been said this season about the success of our first team, but equal accolades also go out to our Reserve team for notching up a best ever second position in the league. A lot of the credit for this great effort must go to coach, Alen Lewis.

Alen was born in 1940, in the London suburb of Manor Park and he didn't stray too far away from that part of England for the next 34 years.

At the age of 5, with the war not long over, he started school at Essex Primary. In 1947, he moved to Kensington Primary School and finally in 1951, he started at Cornwall Secondary where he stayed until he left school in 1955.

Like most boys in England, he played soccer all during his school years and was fortunate enough to represent the Essex Championship League and the South East London League. When he was 15, Alen was invited to trials at West Ham and even got down to the last 6000 possibles!

In 1955, Alen left school and went to work for William Smith Co. - waterproofing tarpaulins. He stayed there for two years then joined Bonds of London [confectionary manufacturing] and it was while he was employed there that he went on a blind date - at the blind school [ABC Cinema, Ilford] and met his wife. In 1962, on St. Patrick's Day, they were married in St. Andrews Church, Ilford, and for the next two years set up house in the suburb of Upton Park.

In 1964, Alen changed jobs and went to work for the Sunblest Bread Co. as a driver salesman. Also, that year, Alen bought a house in Elm Park in Essex and lived there for ten years before moving to Australia in 1974.

When they arrived in this country, they lived in Dandenong for three weeks, then moved to Baxter where they have been ever since. Alen got a job, as soon as he got here, with Swing Soft Drinks, and then in 1975 he moved to his present company - Kwikasair Transport.

Alen didn't waste any time in getting involved in soccer out here and for three years [1976-8] coached junior teams at Baxter, then Baxter seniors - in the Bayside League and District League - gaining an ulcer on the way! This season he has coached Karingal Reserves - and gained two!!

Alen has three children, Julie [16], Stephen [14] and Malcolm [12]. Needless to say, the boys are very involved in soccer.

Stephen played at Baxter 1975-1979 [representing the Region in 1979], Karingal 1980 and now Frankston City. Malcolm played at Baxter 1977-1979, Karingal 1980, and now back to Baxter. It is interesting to note that wherever Dad goes, the boys leave!

Alen has been an important part of Karingal's success this year, and he believes the future of Karingal is very bright. Possibly more money should be spent on training equipment [weights, exercise bikes, soccer balls] and players should start to think about becoming more professional in their attitudes, but he firmly believes that with the right application, Karingal should reach No.1 spot in 1982.

Thanks to our P.R. Officer, Alan Johnstone for pestering me every month for stories for the magazine.

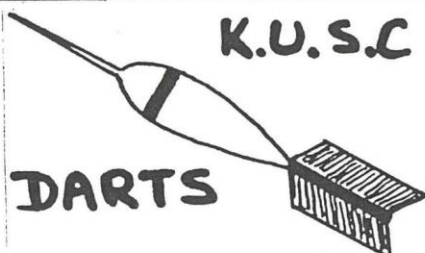
Last, but not least, thanks to my wife Rose for persevering all year with me running out of the house nearly every night. The conversation was usually the same.

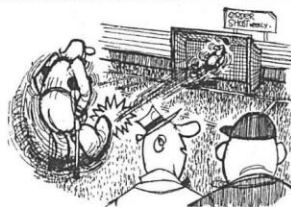
Karingal 4
