COACH'S COLUMN

Since the last report what has happened can only be described as a mini-disaster. Seven front line players have suffered injuries and one suspension to seriously diminish our playing strength over the last month or six weeks. Dave Sharp and Brian Clothier are still out with injury at the time of writing, whilst Ian Lesslie and, tragically, Bob Brickley won't play again this season. This all sounds like a lame excuse for poor performances over the period but it has been the worst hit team for injuries I have been with over such a period that I remember in ten years of coaching. But we are slowly getting back to full strength. Alan Parrott has returned to the team despite still feeling a pulled thigh muscle, as has Steve Cargill (calf) and Andy Taylor has served his three weeks suspension from two early send offs. Brian Clothier is suffering from a strained achilles tendon and Dave Sharp from knee ligaments, and happily both will return soon. Ian Lesslie (cracked ribs) is now overseas on holiday but does not return until the last game of the season. The biggest blow of all of course, to rub the salt into the wound, was the tragedy of Bob Brickley ending his season, and possibly his career, with a broken leg. Bob has been a magnificent player for Karingal, and his determination and effort has been a superb example to all the other players. He was an excellent captain of the first team and his consistent lasting performances won him the clubs best player last season. He will be sorely missed by all.

Amazingly though we still find ourselves hanging on to the top teams, and with a little luck, for when such an injury list occurs, consistency goes out the window, we may still pull off promotion, or even the league title, but we must all pull together now while the chance is still there.

The Reserves have also suffered, naturally, as we have used their resources, and Derek Miller, John Black, Paul McPyke, Billy Jara, Tony Mackay, Tommy Weir and Kevin Iles have all done well in the senior ranks. The 2nd team however have slowly regained their solid position and should still pull it off. With players coming back it should be relatively easy.

PLAYER PROFILE SAM JORDAN

Our ambition at the start of this season was to win through to Metro Leagues. Some new players were brought in and an important one of these was Sam Jordan. Already top goal scorer, Sam's experience and enthusiasm on the field has proved invaluable to the team and has been a big part of our present success.

Sam was born in Belfast, Northern Ireland in September, 1945, and he lived there for the next seventeen years. When he was five, in 1950, he started at Holy Cross Primary School and then in 1956, he moved up to St. Gabriel's Secondary Intermediate.

It was while he was at St. Gabriel's that Sam started playing soccer, and, in fact, while he was playing for the school they were league champions for three years. He was also selected and represented Northern Ireland in their School Boys National Team.

Sam left school in 1952 and worked for nearly a year as an apprentice bricklayer studying under his father. By the end of that year, he had decided to make a change and set out for a new life in Australia. He arrived in Perth early in 1963, stayed there for six months, then moved to settle permanently in Melbourne.

He hadn't been here long when, on a visit to Mount Martha Camping Ground, he met Christine and three years later, in 1966, they were married at St. Mary Magdalens in Jordanville.

He didn't waste much time in getting involved with soccer either. In 1964, he joined Waverley City Soccer Club at the start of what was to become an incredible sixteen years with one club.

During these years, he helped the team to three championship titles in 1965, 1967 and 1975. He was voted "best and fairest" in 1965, runner-up in 1971 and for ten of the years he was top goal-scorer.

Sam didn't confine his time at Waverley just to playing and he coached the Under 12 team to two league championships and the Ladies soccer team to two league championships. He even had a spell as coach of the Victorian Ladies Soccer team.

Over the years, Sam has worked as a bricklayer for various companies, but at the moment he is working as a forklift driver for Arnott, Brockhoff & Guests at Burwood. Sam and Christine have two children - Kaija (15) and Donna (13).

In 1980, Sam finally moved soccer clubs and joined Shepparton United in the Provisional League. He had a very successful spell with them being top goal scorer in the league, and being voted Third in the Victorian Best and Fairest. This season, Sam joined Karingal and, although he has had some injury problems at times, he is still banging in the goals - eleven in all to date.

Sam sees a very bright future for Karingal Soccer Club since he feels the people involved are ambitious and are working hard towards a future in the Metro and State Leagues.

With the season more than half finished I think it's time to have a look at the squad in depth and assess how the boys are faring.

STEVEN SHAW is our first team goalkeeper who also plays mid-field in the second team. If Steven wasn't such a good keeper he would be in the first team as a midfield player but he is invaluable in goal.

Our regular first team defenders are MATHEW KREN and CRAIG BUTLER. CRAIG started off the season shakily, but has since steadied and he was our "BEST PLAYER" in the recent tournament we played at Seaford. MATHEW is a very uncompromising defender; no forward overcomes him easily and his 'WILL TO WIN' is very evident both in matches and in training.

It's hard to believe that this time last season STEVEN ANDERSON was an average mid fielder in our U/7 second team with two goals to his credit. This season he is 'STARRING' in our midfield with 19 goals scored and a dozen or more assists.

Our main striker is DANIEL DOCHERTY, DANIEL has 21 goals so far and has been a very consistent striker scoring goals against every team in the league except Berwick. Daniel is also the second teams regular goalkeeper and does well in this position too.

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PROFILE ALAN JOHNSTONE.

It had to happen! Three years of forcing members to reveal their secrets in the profile column has finally backfired on our magazine editor. Under threats from the committee he has agreed, reluctantly, to tell his story.

Alan was born in Gourrock, Scotland in 1937, and, the son of a railwayman, he lived in the same attic flat with his family for over 24 years.

His school years started in 1942 at Gourrock Eastern Primary. He stayed there for seven years until he was 12, moved to Gourrock High for three years, then finally struggled through three years at Greenock High.

Alan didn't play much soccer as a boy, since usually he was too busy holding down some sort of job outside school hours. He always knew he could have been a great player with a famous club like Celtic, Rangers, Man.Utd. or even the ultimate - Greenock Morton!

In 1954, he left school, glad to get away from studying, started as an apprentice quantity surveyor in Greenock and found himself plunged back into more studying than ever.

Early in 1958, and just a day before sitting some exams, Alan met Anne at a local dance hall. They made a vague date to meet again the following week after the exams. They both turned up not even sure if the date had even been made and from that the romance blossomed.

Alan had real class! Expensive meals, gifts, flowers, were not good enough for his young lady. A regular seat in Morton's grandstand on cold miserable Saturday afternoons seemed a far greater prize. Anne must have been overwhelmed by his generosity!

June 1960, Anne and Alan were married. They lived with Alan's parents for a time before moving South to London and a flat in Putney. Alan was a qualified quantity surveyor by this time and he got a job on the Barbican Project. Fifteen months later, in 1962, they moved into their first house in Sutton, Surrey. Early 1964, their daughter Carole was born.

Anne had just got the house the way she wanted it, when Alan got restless again. Within six months they had sold up and were on their way to Australia. The Poms weren't interested in hearing him talk about Morton, Maybe the Aussies would be!

Alan got a job with a firm of quantity surveyors in the city and in 1965 they settled in Karingal. Two years later, Grant was born.

Alan waited until Anne was really settled in again this time before he made noises about moving again. In 1971, they sold up again and travelled back to U.K., visiting New Zealand, Fiji, Acapulco, Panama, Miami, Niagra Falls, and Connecticut on the way. The move back was really a disaster, made worse by the fact that Alan only saw two Morton games and they lost both. After a couple of years living in London, then Scotland, they were soon back in Australia - this time for good!

Alan went to work again for his old firm, this time as senior cost planner, and early in 1974 they again bought a house in Karingal.

His first contact with soccer here was with Grant playing in Clayton's U/7 and U/8B teams. Then in 1976 Grant transferred to Karingal and this was the start of Alan's involvement with the club.

During the years 1977-78-79, he managed his son's junior team, then the next year as well as managing, he took on the job of producing the club magazine. 1980 became a bit hectic at times for him, still managing the juniors, doing the magazine and for the first time working on the executive committee. This year the magazine is in it's third year and Alan is in his second year on the committee.

An ardent Karingal seniors and juniors supporter, (Morton eat your heart out!). Alan feels it is important to always work towards keeping the club UNITED. He is happy with the present policy of blending youth with experience in the Reserve Team and hopes that this will be expanded in the future into the senior team. The strength of any club ultimately depends a lot on its youth.

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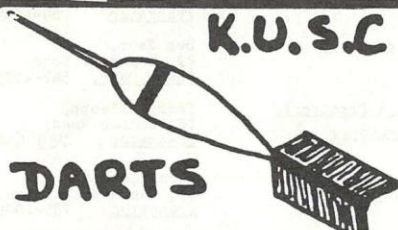
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Karingal 1 Div 2 (Captain George Lamb)
