A special mention to our two most improved players of the season in Luke Hynes and Sean Hettel.

In the under 7 carnival we were a bit unlucky being eliminated from the finals by Berwick who we beat on the previous day 2-0. In conclusion I would like to thank the boys and parents involved for a very enjoyable year. A special thanks to Tony Noel and Andrew Timms for their umpiring efforts. The season would have to be considered successful with us winning 75% of our games.

While most of us were still on the beach and wondering if the world would ever cool down again some of our junior players were striving for selection in the Peninsula Regional Squad. Two of our boys, Dean Simkin and Paul Helmore made the squad and played in the Regional Championships held over two weekends at the end of March and beginning of April at Croydon. Peninsula were not as successful as we had hoped. Seven regional teams competed and of the six games that Peninsula played = against each of the other teams = it won one, drew one and lost the other four. However Skye is proud that two of its boys were selected and we hope the experience will stand them in good stead in the future. By and large the teams that Peninsula met were big, strong and fast and it was all good practice. The squad was composed of under-12 and under-11 boys and so Dean should be especially congratulated. Despite his lack of years - he qualifies as an under-11 player but plays with Skye under-12s - and lack of inches both up and across he mixed it with the best of them. Both Dean and Paul received their regional badges as a presentation night at the Mornington Soccer Club in June. All the boys found one of the biggest problems was the timing. Because the championship games had to be played before the winter season got under way training and selection had to take place in late February and early March. The training grounds at Seaford were rock hard and the boys taking part, used to wearing thongs all summer, and having to force their feet into last seasons boots often found the going very hard. 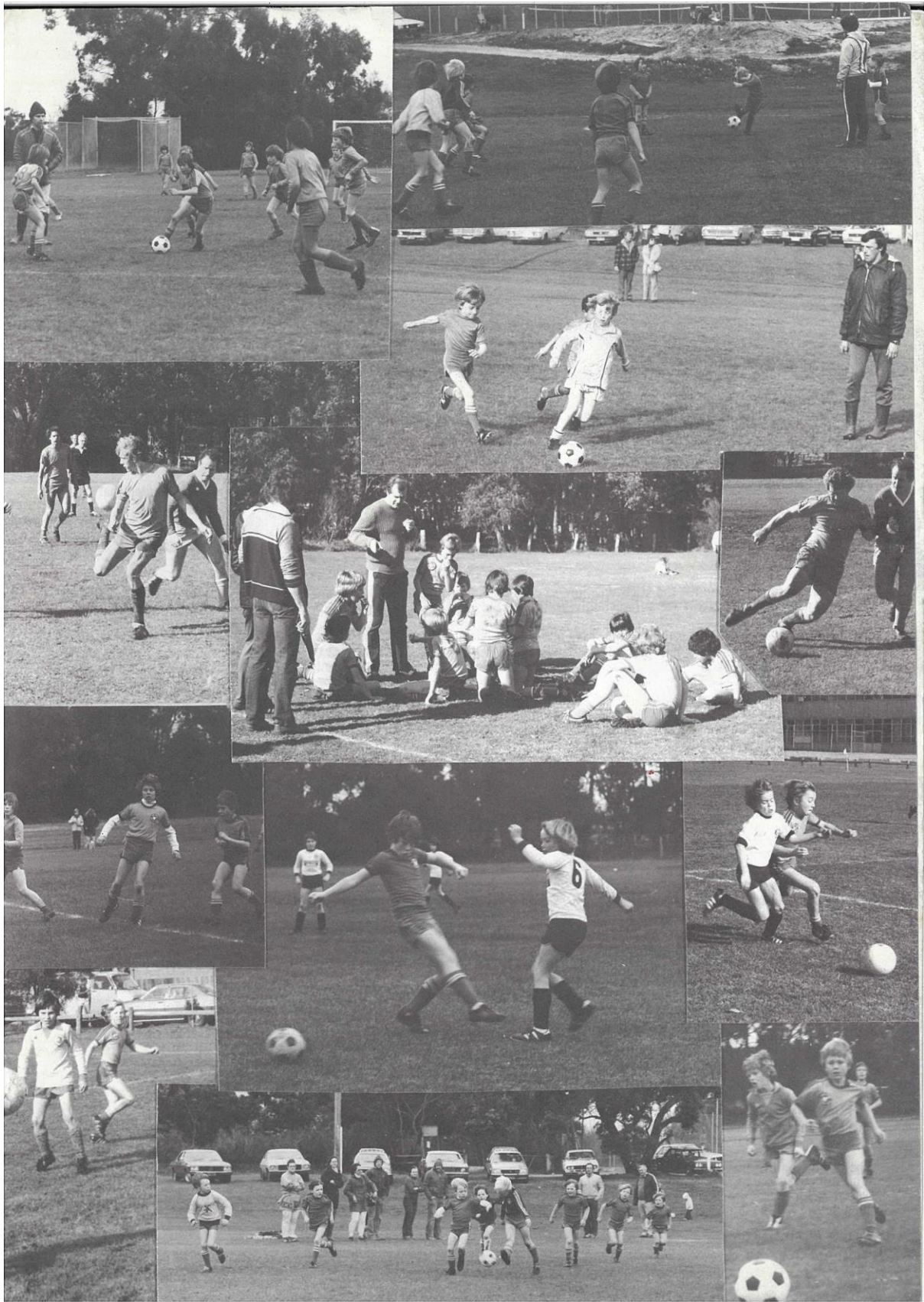

Most parents will be aware by now that some of our older boys and our seniors have been able to train under lights on a Wednesday evening at Skye Ground since quite early in the season. The lights were the result of a grant from the Ministry of Youth Sport and Recreation and the work of Angus Morrison.. Club President Kevin Finlay officially switched the lights on for the first time in early May.

The benefits are enormous.. Our older boys can now have two coaching sessions a week, their normal Monday afternoon session and the Wednesday night at the ground. The presence of senior players on the Wednesday night sessions means that the boys can have individual tuition in the many arts of the game.

The enthusiasm of the boys for the night training is great to see. We are starting to see some of the results of this training on the field and we hope that it will become even more evident next season.

We have a lot of boys playing in our various age groups.. A large proportion of them are under nine and younger and there are quite a few at under 10. We have enough under-11s but after that the picture becomes a little grim.. Our under-12 team (which will be next seasons under-13s) has only nine boys of true under-12 rating. The team counts as valuable members three or four under-11 boys and plays this mixed team each week. However if one or two boys cant make a game - and this often happens through family holidays and weekends away and other activities such as scouts or other sports - we are hard put to it to field a full strength team. All you parents out there dont need to be told how expensive it is to buy soccer boots for your boys at the beginning of a season. And we are sure you cant believe how quickly your sons' feet grow and how soon they need to have newboots. But when you are buying rhe new ones please don't throw the old ones away. Give them to the club.
We hope that this way we may be able to build up a stock of boots and hand them down the line. Many hopefuls turn up for training and some stay and some don't. We can give them a chance to try out the game without the expense. We can also keep the cost of buying boots down by donating them to other regular players.
If properly cared for most boots will last at least two seasons and this will keep down the cost of preparing for another winter.

That green shirt that your son is so proud of looks really great and it is very tempting to wear it to training sessions. We have to ask you not to let your son do so. The same is true of shorts and socks provided by the club. All three articles are fairly durable but take quite a pounding out there in the middle. The club ruling is that strip only be worn at club games.. The reason is that this way it last longer and we can keep membership costs down.
The alternative can be a tee-shirt, old PE shorts and old socks - it does not matter at all at training - but please keep the club strip for the real thing at the weekends.
Perhaps your boys would like to sport their favourite Collingwood guernsey (Carna Pies) or perhaps they are Blues or Hawks fans. These sorts of jumpers certainly make the training sessions more colourful!

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
